Clinical medical ethics is a field that examines the practical, everyday ethical issues that arise in encounters among patients, doctors, nurses, allied health workers, and health care institutions. Since the founding of the MacLean Center and largely through the efforts of its faculty members and fellowship graduates, the study of clinical medical ethics has expanded from the bedside to encompass virtually all aspects of health care. In October 2013, the MacLean Center received the Cornerstone Award from the American Society for Bioethics and Humanities (ASBH) for "outstanding contributions from an Institution that has helped shape the direction of the fields of bioethics and/or medical humanities."
