The University contacted these approximately 2,600 students to provide them the opportunity to apply for Emergency Financial Aid Grants, based on their expenses incurred as a result of the disruption of campus activities due to Covid-19, pursuant to the application process described in Section 7A immediately below. B) The University of Chicago announced a second application round on October 5, 2020 and invited students in degree programs to apply so long as
	they met specified requirements related to Title IV eligibility and had reported an income from work equal to or below the applicable threshold. These requirements are set forth in Section 7B immediately below.
7. Any instructions, directions, or guidance provided by the institution to students concerning the Emergency Financial Aid Grants.	A) On June 4, 2020, students as described above were notified via email that the University of Chicago would receive and distribute Emergency Financial Aid Grants under the CARES Act in an amount of up to \$2,500. Students were directed to an FAQ page for further information and a link to the online application. Upon submission of the application, students were notified that they

would receive a communication to their University student email notifying them as to whether they application had been approved.

- B) The instructions for the second application round were as follows: In order to be considered eligible to receive this CARES Act HEERF funding, a student must meet all five of the following requirements:
 - 1. Be currently enrolled in a degree-granting program
 - 2. Be currently making satisfactory academic progress as defined by the student's program
 - 3. Have submitted a 2020-2021 FAFSA indicating the University as a recipient by October 16, 2020.
 - 4. Have reported in their 2020-2021 FAFSA a 2018 income from work of equal to or less than the applicable threshold
 - a. If a student's 2018 income exceeded the applicable threshold, but they had experienced a reduction in 2020 annual income that met the above income threshold for eligibility, the student had the opportunity to supplement their HEERF application with proof of estimated annual income for 2020.
 - 5. Have incurred expenses related to the disruption of University of Chicago campus operations due to coronavirus

(noting that loss of income is not considered an expense and that students cannot request HEERF funds to cover COVID-related expenses that have been or will be paid or reimbursed by any other source (including University emergency aid or HEERF funding that was distributed to the student in the Spring Quarter)).
