

enables International House to continue to strengthen its links with the University of Chicago and the City of Chicago in ways that are commensurate with its institutional position of promoting cross-cultural understanding and respect and the exchange of ideas among people of all nations and backgrounds. Last year, this program provided over 11,000 attendees with meaningful opportunities for discussion and engagement in community, national and world affairs. Again this year, International House was pleased to receive support from the McCormick Tribune Foundation to support our World Beyond the Headlines lecture series, a component of our successful Global Voices Program. Funds are



being used for an expanded series of programs which contribute to our goal of developing an active, knowledgeable, and engaged citizenry.

In addition to lecture programs, the Global Voices Performing Arts Series provides a showcase for all performing arts programs at International House. This year International House again received support from the Illinois Arts Council to expand our role as presenter and co-sponsor of innovative, internationally-focused arts programs. Last year over 10,000 attendees enjoyed over 40 Global Voices Performing Arts Programs. These programs have provided an inspiring, engaging and meaningful experience for the University of Chicago community and for the people of Chicago.

Malou Innocent: Foreign Policy Analyst



Malou Innocent, the 2006–2007 Mrs. Ernst W. Puttkammer Resident Award recipient is currently a Foreign Policy Analyst at the Cato Institute in Washington DC. The Puttkammer Award is given each

year to a resident who has made a significant contribution to the life of the House. The award is presented at the Spring Sunday Supper by Lorna Puttkammer Straus, SM'60, PhD'62.

Travel in Time: Stories from the International House Archives—Wolfgang Langewiesche

The 1930s was the era of aviation heroes. Icons like Charles Lindbergh and Amelia Earhart inspired dreams of unfettered travel over unchartered paths. For Wolfgang Langewiesche, a



German-born bespectacled graduate student studying library science at the University of Chicago, the lure of the open sky proved irresistible. "Every afternoon at three the sound of the transcontinental ship came down to me in the library, plaguing me ...it was fresh from the West, only a matter of hours, and that too tormented me; for out there was the country I liked, the part of America I had cut my teeth on...One afternoon at three, something snapped: I put some markers into my books and put on

my hat and drove my old car to the nearest used car lot. It fetched exactly seventy-five dollars: five hours of ship time. Out to the airport...stripped of my worldly goods, a happy

fool...I was going to fly cross-country. I was going to make this thing work or give up." His passion for aviation was legendary among his friends at International House, who sometimes accompanied him on short flights to help pay for training time

he needed to pilot a plane cross-country. Langewiesche would go on to chronicle his life in flight in *America from the Air*, but it is his now classic work, *Stick and Rudder*, published in 1944, that remains the leading book on the art of flying.

IN MEMORIAN



Amadou Cisse, PhD 'o7 arrived at International House from Senegal in the fall of 2001, eager to begin his graduate work at the University of Chicago. On November 1, 2007,

Cisse successfully defended his doctoral dissertation in Chemistry. Tragically, he was shot and killed in an attempted robbery outside of his Chicago apartment on November 19, 2007. The University of Chicago awarded Amadou Cisse his PhD in Chemistry posthumously at graduation ceremonies on December 7, 2007.

Majid K. Khadduri PhD'38, considered one of the world's foremost experts on the Middle East, authored over 35 books in English and Arabic and

hundreds of articles. He
was a member of the Iraqi
delegation to the founding session of the
United Nations of San Francisco in 1945.
He founded the Graduate Middle East Studies
Program of the Johns Hopkins University Paul

Program of the Johns Hopkins University Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) and taught there from 1949 to 1980. While a resident of International House, he was President of the Residents' Council in 1937. He died January 25, 2007 in Potomac, Maryland at 98 years of age.

Vernon Petro, long-time friend of International House and President of the Chicago chapter of the International House Association (I.H.A.), passed away December 2007. The I.H.A. was an organization formed between the New York, Berkeley, and Chicago Houses whose mission was to enhance the relationships and experiences of I-House residents during their time in the United States. The Chicago chapter under the leadership of Mr. Petro was particularly active in organizing social programs and field trips to communities and attractions outside the city of Chicago.

Spotlight on Endowed Fellowship Recipients

The 2007– 2008 Anita and Minsun Chen Endowed Fellowship was awarded to



Nianshen Song, a new graduate student entering the University of Chicago to pursue his PhD in History. He received his Master of Science degree in Comparative Politics from the London School of Economics, and his Bachelor of Arts degree in Chinese Language and Literature from the University of International Relations in Beijing, China. He has translated, edited and published numerous books in China and until recently was editor and correspondent for the prestigious Global Times newspaper in Beijing. While a Chief Correspondent for the Global Times, Nianshen reported on the Iragi war as an unembedded journalist in Kuwait, Qatar, Iraq and Jordan. Nianshen has traveled extensively throughout the world and views living at International House as an extension of his global journeys.

The 2007–2008 Gioh Fang and T.S. Ma Endowed Fellow-



ship was awarded to **Ying Zhu**, who is a new graduate student in the Master of Science in Financial Mathematics Program at the University of Chicago. She received her Bachelor of Science degree in applied mathematics from Fudan University in Shanghai and has received numerous awards in mathematics throughout China. She has worked as Assistant General Manager at Haitong Securities Co., LTD in Shanghai and was a Financial Analyst

at Guangdong Development Bank in Shanghai. One of Ying's passions is traditional Chinese painting and she enjoys the opportunities of cultural exchange that International House provides to her.

The International House Global Fellowship Initiative

The International House Global Fellowship Initiative ensures the exceptional geographical, cultural, and economic diversity that is central to the mission of I-House and the University of Chicago. Global Fellows reside at I-House throughout the academic year and are expected to contribute their unique perspectives and interests to the community. In turn, International House provides a supportive on-campus environment that helps ensure their personal fulfillment and academic success. The Global Fellowship Initiative provides crucial funding for students to assist them in meeting living expenses.

Gifts at the following levels endow in perpetuity Global Fellowships for students residing at I-House:

- \$40,000 endows a fund providing one student each year with \$1500 to help meet a major portion of the residential expenses for one quarter of the academic year
- \$80, 000 endows a fund providing one student each year with \$3000 to meet nearly 70% of the residential expenses over two quarters of the academic year
- \$160, ooo endows a fund providing one student each year with \$6000 to meet nearly the full cost of the residential expenses for three quarters of the academic year


