The MacLean Center for Clinical Medical Ethics at the University of Chicago is the oldest, largest, and most successful program in clinical ethics in the world. Clinical medical ethics is a field that examines the practical, everyday ethical issues that arise in encounters among patients, doctors, nurses, allied health workers, and health care institutions. The goal of clinical medical ethics is to improve patient care and outcomes and also to improve clinicians' satisfaction with their work. Since the founding of the MacLean Center in 1984, the Center has trained more than 450 clinical ethics fellows in a one year full-time or part-time training program. Current and former MacLean Center fellows and faculty have published more than 200 books. In November 2016, Dr. Siegler and the MacLean Center received the prestigious Meyerhoff Award from the Johns Hopkins Berman Institute of Bioethics. The award states: "The training program established by you has had a greater impact than any other clinical ethics training program in the world."
