Smart Museum of Art announces solo Theaster Gates exhibition


The exhibition will open September 23, 2025 and run through February 22, 2026 and will mark the artist's first solo museum show in his hometown of Chicago.

CHICAGO, IL — The Smart Museum of Art will present an expansive solo museum exhibition of Chicago-based artist Theaster Gates from September 23, 2025, through February 22, 2026. Theaster Gates: Unto Thee centers on the multifaceted practice of Theaster Gates and explores how he employs sculpture to expose the complexities of surrender and accumulation through a series of large-scale installations, music and film, and the redeployment of deaccessioned objects from the University of Chicago, where Gates is currently Professor of Visual Arts. This exhibition is made possible by Northern Trust and the Terra Foundation for American Art.

Organized by the Smart's Dana Feitler Director Vanja Malloy and curator Galina Mardilovich in close collaboration with the artist, the exhibition will incorporate objects that have been foundational to Gates's practice and his custodianship of culturally significant collections. The exhibition will also present Gates's latest work that continues to build on the material legacies of underrecognized histories, voices, and, in some cases, institutional structures first mined in these University objects, and considered as a whole for the first time.

"Theaster Gates redefines what it means to be both an artist and a civic leader—his work doesn't just hang on walls, it transforms spaces, communities, and conversations. Nowhere is this more powerfully felt than in Chicago, where his visionary projects have revitalized neighborhoods and reimagined the role of culture in public life. His practice reminds us that art can be a force for restoration, justice, and hope," commented Vanja Malloy.

Gates's recent work includes a series of monolithic ceramic vessels, paintings, and films. These works are imbued with formal gestures and personal references from the use of materials like tar, paying homage to the inheritance of skilled labor from his father, who was a roofer by trade, to the artist's original artistic training in Japanese ceramics. As emphasized by their positioning with deaccessioned University objects, these works



and exhibition will amplify Gates's investment in elevating invisible labor, interrogating artistic legacies, questioning economies of power, and, equally, celebrating Black artistic and intellectual contributions.

"Unto Thee explores my own relationship with the accumulation of objects, particularly objects that I've gleaned from the University of Chicago over the last 20 years," remarked Theaster Gates. "This exhibition is, in many ways, a retrospective of these materials, demonstrating how they've been redeployed and are being returned back to the University of Chicago as a temporary resting place. I hope this exhibition demonstrates how an artist's adjacency to an institution can create new forms and new meaning from things that were cast off but are absolutely essential and central to the artistic canon."

The large-scale solo exhibition will also be accompanied by a site-specific installation in the museum's lobby gallery, part of the Museum's Threshold Series, that will be on view through July 2026.

Theaster Gates: Unto Thee underscores the artist's belief in the "life within things," including a block formerly abandoned and derelict buildings on Chicago's South Side that he has rescued and reconstituted into spaces for experimental artistic projects. To that end, in collaboration with Gates, the exhibition will be accompanied by programming with the artist, scholars, students, educators, and community partners. With insights from leading experts in conceptualism, craft, critical archival practices, urbanism, and ethnomusicology, programs will respond to works on view and the exhibition's themes, as well as act as a shared space for creative production, generative knowledge, and cultural discourse. Drawing on Gates's own performance practice, the Museum will present an array of programming organized on-site at the Smart and off-site around the South Side, including a performance by The Black Monks. Programming also includes screenings of Gates's film-based projects.

The exhibition's accompanying catalogue will further examine Gates's artistic practice and its multidisciplinary implications and possibilities. Co-edited by Mardilovich and Malloy, published by the Smart Museum of Art and distributed by the University of Chicago Press, the volume will feature an interview with Gates, as well as five scholarly essays by a diverse group of contributors, each of whom will center on a specific theme raised by the exhibition and Gates's work.

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About Theaster Gates

Theaster Gates is an artist whose practice finds roots in conceptual formalism, sculpture, space theory, land art, and performance. Trained in urban planning and within the tradition of Japanese ceramics, Gates's artistic philosophy is guided by the concepts of Shintoism, Buddhism and Animism - most notably honoring the "spirit within things." Foundational to Gates's practice is his custodianship and critical redeployment of culturally significant Black objects, archives, and spaces. Known for his recirculation of art-world capital, Gates smartly upturns art values, land values, and human values. In all aspects of his work, he contends with the notion of Black space as a formal exercise - one defined by collective desire, artistic agency, and the tactics of a pragmatist. Through the expansiveness of his approach as a thinker, maker, and builder, Gates extends the life of disappearing and bygone histories, places, and cultural traditions.

Gates has exhibited and performed at the Albuquerque Foundation, Sintra, Portugal (2024); The LUMA Foundation, Arles, France (2023, 2024); The New Museum, New York, (2022); The Aichi Triennial, Tokoname (2022); The Serpentine Pavilion, London (2022); The Victoria and Albert Museum, London, UK (2021); Whitechapel Gallery, London, UK (2013 and 2021); Tate Liverpool, UK (2020); Haus der Kunst, Munich (2020); Walker Art Center, Minneapolis (2019); Palais de Tokyo Paris, France (2019); Sprengel Museum Hannover, Germany (2018); Kunstmuseum Basel, Switzerland (2018); National Gallery of Art, Washington D.C. (2017); Art Gallery of Ontario, Canada (2016); Fondazione Prada, Milan, Italy (2016); Kunsthaus Bregenz, Austria (2016); Punta della Dogana, Venice, Italy (2013); and dOCUMENTA (13), Kassel, Germany (2012).

Gates is a professor at the University of Chicago in the Department of Visual Arts and the College. He is the recipient of numerous awards and honorary degrees including the Guggenheim Fellowship (2025); Isamu Noguchi Award (2023); National Buildings Museum Vincent Scully Prize (2023); Frederick Kiesler Prize for Architecture and the Arts (2022); an Honorary Fellowship from the Royal Institute of British Architects (2021); the World Economic Forum Crystal Award (2020); J.C. Nichols Prize for Visionaries in Urban Development (2018); Nasher Sculpture Prize (2018); Sprengel Museum Kurt Schwitters Prize (2017); and Artes Mundi 6 Prize (2015).
