The Allure of Matter: Material Art from China presents epic works of contemporary art at both the Smart Museum of Art and Wrightwood 659 February 7–May 3, 2020

45 works showcasing ordinary materials used in extraordinary ways





(Nov. 6, 2019) From gunpowder to human hair, and silk to cigarettes, the materiality of contemporary art from China will be on display in two iconic Chicago neighborhoods this winter. Organized by the Smart Museum of Art in Hyde Park along with Wrightwood 659 in Lincoln Park, *The Allure of Matter: Material Art from China* (February 7–May 3, 2020) features 45 two- and three-dimensional works made from a range of unique and humble materials, like melted plastic, paper-thin porcelain, desiccated Coca-Cola ash, and 300,000 iron nails. The works, many monumental in scale, explore how conscious material choice has become a symbol of expression for a number of leading Chinese contemporary artists working over the last four decades. The artist roster includes Ai Weiwei, Cai Guo-Qiang, Xu Bing, Yin Xiuzhen, Song Dong, gu wenda, and Lin Tianmiao.

The Allure of Matter is the first exhibition partnership between the Smart Museum and Wrightwood 659. Too large for a single venue, the exhibition takes up the full gallery footprint of both institutions. It opens twenty years after the Smart Museum's first contemporary Chinese art project with exhibition co-curator and University of Chicago professor **Wu Hung**.

"The Allure of Matter brings to the fore an incredible roster of artists who have developed intensely personal connections with unconventional materials. Taken together, the works introduce a broader framework for understanding global contemporary art, which I call 'Material Art' or *caizhi yishu*, where material—rather than image or style—is the paramount vehicle of aesthetic, political, and emotional expression," said Wu Hung, Smart Museum Adjunct Curator, Harrie A. Vanderstappen Distinguished Service Professor of Art History, and Director of the Center for the Art of East Asia at the University of Chicago.

"Through their under-studied experimentations and often overlooked use of unconventional materials, the artists featured in *The Allure of Matter* have broken away from past art practices and styles. Their monumental works represent a multifaceted phenomenon that inspires us to ask big questions about our relationship to the everyday material world around us as well as the interrelationship between Chinese art and broader trends in contemporary art globally," added **Orianna Cacchione**, exhibition co-curator and Smart Museum Curator of Global Contemporary Art.

"Thanks to an extraordinary partnership between Wrightwood 659 and the Smart Museum, the largest exhibition of Material Art ever mounted will be on view in Chicago. Alphawood Foundation is very proud to sponsor Wu Hung's remarkable exhibition, *The Allure of Matter*, which presents an entirely new genre of fine art—Material Art—as practiced by the most prominent Chinese artists working today. The Allure of Matter showcases 45 works which are complementary in form, material, and visual effect. It is divided into two unique halves at the Smart Museum (24 works by 16 artists) and Wrightwood 659 (21 works by 14 artists). To fully experience the exhibition, guests are encouraged to visit both locations. Notably, this presentation of *The Allure of Matter* expands upon the version debuted in spring 2019 at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, with nine additional works being shown only in Chicago.

The Allure of Matter features work by Ai Weiwei, Cai Guo-Qiang, Chen Zhen, Gu Dexin, gu wenda, He Xiangyu, Hu Xiaoyuan, Huang Yong Ping, Jin Shan, Liang Shaoji, Lin Tianmiao, Liu Jianhua, Liu Wei, Ma Qiusha, Shi Hui, Song Dong, Sui Jianguo, Sun Yuan and Peng Yu, Wang Jin, Xu Bing, Yin Xiuzhen, Zhan Wang, Zhang Huan, Zhang Yu, and Zhu Jinshi.

Launching in full in early 2020, the **companion website**, <u>theallureofmatter.org</u>, will provide a digital bridge between the exhibition's two physical halves while offering supplementary content—including original interviews and behind-the-scenes videos and photos—revealing each artist's working process and personal relationship with their material.

The exhibition is accompanied by a self-titled **catalogue**, the first scholarly volume to examine Chinese art through the lens of materiality. The catalogue, published by the Smart Museum of Art and distributed by the University of Chicago Press, is written by co-curators Wu Hung and Orianna Cacchione, with essays by Christine Mehring and Trevor Smith and additional entries by Susanna Ferrell, Wan Kong, Simone Levine, and Nancy P. Lin.

The Allure of Matter is co-organized by the Smart Museum of Art with Wrightwood 659 and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Seattle Art Museum, and the Peabody Essex Museum.

The exhibition is curated by Wu Hung, Smart Museum Adjunct Curator, Harrie A. Vanderstappen Distinguished Service Professor of Art History, and Director of the Center for the Art of East Asia at the University of Chicago, with Orianna Cacchione, Smart Museum Curator of Global Contemporary Art.

Visiting Wrightwood 659

Wrightwood 659, a private, non-collecting institution devoted to socially engaged art and to architecture, presents three public exhibitions annually. Located in Chicago's Lincoln Park neighborhood, Wrightwood 659 was designed by Pritzker Prize-winning architect, Tadao Ando, who transformed a 1920s building with his signature concrete forms and poetic treatment of natural light. In a city rich with art institutions and internationally known for its architecture, Wrightwood 659 is designed as a site for contemplative experiences of art and architecture, and as a place to engage with the pressing social issues of our time. During the exhibition, free general admission tickets will be released each Tuesday for the current week.
